## We Are All Hindus Now?

My daughter Amy caught an interesting article in the August 24 & 31 issue of *Newsweek* magazine (page 70)—“We are all Hindus now” the title proclaimed. I could see why the article caught her attention.

The article noted that only about a million people call themselves Hindu in the United States and 76% of Americans call themselves Christian. But, as the author, Lisa Miller, writes “we are slowly becoming more like Hindus and less like traditional Christians in the ways we think about God, ourselves, each other, and eternity.” I think she’s right.

She quotes the Rig Veda, a Hindu text, “Truth is One, but the sages speak of it by many names.” That is, there are many different paths to God. The author summarizes, “Jesus is one way, the Koran is another, yoga practice is a third. None is better than any other; all are equal.”

I was pleasantly surprised that a reporter was then able to accurately observe how this directly contradicts Christianity. “The most traditional, conservative Christians have not been taught to think like this. They learn in Sunday school that their religion is true, and others are false. Jesus said, ‘I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.’”

She then reports the results of a survey: “Americans are no longer buying it [that Christ is the way, the truth and the life].” “65% of us believe that ‘many religions can lead to eternal life’—including 37% of white evangelicals, the group most likely to believe that salvation is theirs alone.”

There is another theological point in which many Americans are in agreement with Hinduism rather than Christianity.

Then there’s the question of what happens when you die. Christians traditionally believe that bodies and souls are sacred, that together they comprise the “self,” and that at the end of time they will be reunited in the Resurrection. You need both, in other words, and you need them forever. Hindus believe no such thing. At death, the body burns on a pyre, while the spirit—the identity resides—escapes. In reincarnation, central to Hinduism, selves come back to earth again and again in different bodies.... 24% of Americans say they believe in reincarnation....

Dearly beloved, the Lord warned us about these days through the Apostle Paul and others in 2 Timothy 4:3-4 for example:

For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine [that is, Biblical teaching], but according to their own desires, because they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers; and they will turn their ears away from the truth, and be turned aside to fables.

It would be good for all in your home to read aloud 2 Timothy 3:1—4:8. These inspired words will equip and encourage you and all in your home to know that the truth of Christ will be contested and rejected and will point you to the solid, certain foundation of truth—the Holy Scriptures which faithfully confess the death and physical resurrection of Jesus Christ who guarantees our physical resurrection from the dead (see 1 Corinthians 15:1-58).

It would also be good, as often as you are physically able, to join us in Bible Study and Sunday School that we can continually be encouraged and equipped by the truth of Holy Scripture to confess Christ Jesus our only life and salvation. It is good to study and learn so we can answer those who mock the exclusiveness of Jesus’ saving work. Jesus is the unique and only-begotten Son of God who became a man. He is the only sinless man. He is the only one who bore the penalty for all mankind’s sin. He alone, through His saving death and physical resurrection, offers to all people forgiveness and life forever—sinful body and forgiven soul now, and a whole, restored, body and perfect soul forever. All our religions were led by people who died and are dead. Only Christians follow a Savior who has conquered the grave, body and soul!

He died once for all. We die once and then are judged. (see Hebrews 9:27-28) No awful cycle of dying again and again with endless bodies.

We are not *all* Hindus now. The Lord will preserve a faithful remnant as Jesus promised, the powers of Hell will not prevail against Christ’s Church (Matthew 16:18).

Thanks be to God for His truth, His protection, and the life He gives us in Christ!

Some foods that are more iron rich are liver, beef roast, beef hamburger, roasted turkey, clams, oysters, shrimp, veal, pork, canned ham, beans, lentils, cooked spinach, tomato juice, bran flakes, cream of wheat, gingerbread, dried apricots, dates, prunes (especially prune juice) and watermelon. ## Foster Parents Needed at Bethany

Bethany Christian Service's Refugee Services Program provides foster care to refugee children between the ages of 14 and 17 who have been separated from home and family, have no adult caregiver and are eligible for protection in the US. We are the only program in the West Michigan area providing foster care to refugee youth, only one of two programs in the State, and we depend on area churches to help us find caring families who are interested in becoming licensed foster parents to refugee youth. This program exists to manifest the love and compassion of Jesus Christ by protecting and enhancing the lives of children and by giving families the opportunity to serve and be blessed in the process.

Bethany Christian Services' Refugee Foster Care Program is seeking homes for Burmese, African & Central American teenage refugees. Room and board is paid for by the State and medical needs are also covered. These teens have been forced from their homes due to war and/or a threat to their lives. ## *Classroom News*

The 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders went to the Grand Rapids Public Museum so see the newest exhibit "Leonardo da Vinci, Machines in Motion." Before we took our trip to the museum, we spent some time in class talking about simple machines, and about two of their upcoming projects, a speech on an inventor and a report on a scientist or an inventor.

Once at the museum, we were met by a docent, who led us through a program on simple and complex machines that culminated in looking at and touching real museum artifacts that contained complex machines, like a wind-up toy elephant that rolled across a table and had a whirligig on its head, a vacuum cleaner, a mini sewing machine, and a cherry-pitter among others.

We then made it into the da Vinci exhibit. Here they were able to actually watch a video about da Vinci, and also read about, observe, and use actual machines which da Vinci himself invented and sketched into his codices. The exhibit also contained an area which included modern hands on manipulatives, and computer generated manipulatives.

After lunch, we received a behind the scenes tour of the museum of the workshops, where exhibits are built and customized. We all enjoyed a carousel ride, and then had time to explore the rest of the museum. Most of us headed right back to the da Vinci exhibit, and then ventured out to some of the other exhibits, such as the streets of old Grand Rapids, Egypt, and Habitats.

We ended the day by viewing two of the pieces of art that were set up for the Art Prize. One of which was a sculpture set up in the Grand River, and the other was a very large table and chairs mounted on top of the blue bridge. Everyone agreed that our Museum was a great little museum, and we all left with a better appreciation of the museum.
